A Time to Remember

A great feature of the iPhone is the facility to take phots and to store them. Regularly I dip into the collection of photos to remember people and events. One of the first people I met after Mass in the Pyrenees was a mountain farmer who lived contentedly with his wife Mary looking after their animals high up on the hillside –Joseph Baque. We became great friends. He loved showing me his beehives and the vegetable garden he was so proud of. Unfortunately he died as a result of injuries when his tractor overturned and pinned him underneath. I was so sorry. At Halloween three years ago, I was in the Pyrenees again and visited Joseph's grave on All Saints Day- Toussaint- and met all his family gathered to remember their loved ones. There was an abundance of Chrysanthemums of varied hues. There is such a run on the sales of these flowers that there are open air markets and the colours are magnificent.

It is now All Saints and All Souls Feast again this weekend when we will celebrate our loved ones who have died. Here in St. Canice's we will celebrate a Memorial Mass online on Monday evening at 7.30pm. We will call the names of the faithful parishioners who have died this past year. I invite you to join Fr. Tom and I to pray for the dead.

Visiting the graves is a lovely custom in France. People come back to their home villages from all over the country. They will not be able to do so this year due to the lockdown. We join with each other in prayer, in loving remembrance of Parents, Family Members and Neighbours.

A traditional prayer we often pray for those who have died is "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them." We could think of rest as suggested in the lovely psalm" The Lord is my Shepherd." "Near restful waters he leads me to revive my drooping spirits." Rest is associated with a revival of our spirits. Eternal rest is an eternal revival of our deepest self. Saint Ephrem wrote "in the kingdom our departed ones achieve their full stature." (Fr. Martin Hogan)

Let us unite in faith and hope and enjoy the time to remember. We remember with thanksgiving in our hearts and look forward in joyful hope. –Jim
