### **Govt. Guidelines for Church Ceremonies**

From 22<sup>nd</sup> October, Religious Ceremonies can proceed without capacity limits but with all other protective measures in place, i.e. Physical distancing, mask wearing, sanitizing and ventilation. Unfortunately this means every second pew will remain roped off and we ask people from different households to continue to observe social distancing in the available pews. The stewards will endeavor to seat as many people as possible in the Church and we ask you to please follow their guidance.

## Please remember that we still need to observe the government guidelines and protocols to protect ourselves and each other.

Facemasks must be worn at all Masses and ceremonies. Please use hand sanitizer before entering the Church. Please observe social distancing both inside and outside the Church. For Communion, we have a one way system- (up the centre aisle and down the side). The people in the side aisles should come up first, followed by the people in the centre aisle. The people in the centre aisle should remain seated until the stewards reach you. Please allow for social distancing and follow the directions of the Stewards. Communion will be given in the hand only. Please take your copy of the newsletter home with you. We appreciate your understanding and cooperation as we work to keep our Church a safe place for all.

### Letter from Bishop Nulty re: Easing of Covid -19 Restrictions

"While we are moving in a positive direction, it is most important that our churches continue to be safe places in which people can gather with confidence in increasing numbers. We therefore ask parishes to examine carefully how the gradual easing of restrictions in their churches can be wisely managed. Consideration should be given to continuing for the time being, some of the many useful practices which have been developed during the pandemic, including good ventilation of buildings, the provision of hand sanitizer and the use of face coverings. We also ask people to exercise strong personal responsibility with regard to good social distancing at all church gatherings. Of course, this will depend on everyone exercising a high degree of care, especially for the most vulnerable in our parish communities who wish to return to Mass and the Sacraments at this time. Sensible hygiene measures and the use of face coverings are among the ways in which people's health can be protected and all can feel confident gathering in church. Advice received recently from the Govt includes the following: As the capacity of Places of Worship and numbers attending varies greatly, we ask each parish to consider what best suits their congregation. This will be particularly relevant for funerals/special ceremonies, with large congregations in attendance. Attendees should not be permitted to stand in the aisles or doorways. Choirs or soloists should be limited in line with the size/capacity of the Church and should adhere to social distancing from other singers. choir master the congregation and other individuals in the setting. We are advised that Covid-19 remains a threat, and so we will all need to be respectful and protective of the well-being of others, taking sensible precautions and allowing space to those around us. The Sunday Eucharist is at the heart of our identity as the People of God. Although throughout the time of pandemic numbers in churches were small and it was necessary at times for people to connect and pray with the community by virtual means online, it is in being present with each other to offer worship to God that we truly express our nature as a community of faith. It is a joy to see the time approaching when this can happen in complete freedom and we all can fulfil our joyful calling to worship as One Body, One Spirit in Christ."
